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Headteacher's news:

It has been a shorter 4 day school week but some how it has felt longer for me. The closure of another 2 class bubbles due to positive Covid-19 cases on Saturday and on Tuesday is probably the answer to this. When the children and staff are not able to attend school in these circumstances, I am counting down the days until they can all return. If the children and adults have not developed symptoms or tested positive since the bubble closures, then Y3 Willow are due to return on Monday 10 May and Y5/6 Ash will be able to return on Tuesday 11 May. In the meantime, I hope that these groups are well and are continuing to follow self isolation guidelines (as well as completing remote learning at home of course!).

I do not take the decision to close bubbles lightly and I speak to the Health & Wellbeing Team at LCC as well as Public Health England (PHE) to get advice in these situations. Whilst I absolutely agree with it, I am frustrated with the length of self-isolation and acknowledge that during this period the vast majority will be unaffected. However, the virus does spread quickly and we must remain vigilant - since I closed one of the bubbles this week, a further 3 positive cases have been reported from this group including asymptomatic cases.

Saying that, I do think that the government needs to work with the NHS, PHE and the Department of Education as we move forward. We all know that the virus is not going to go away and that we are going to have to live with it. In the <u>news a few days ago</u>, there was an article about a new trial taking place giving people daily lateral flow tests for seven days - instead of quarantining for 10 days - and as long as they test negative for this period, they can go about their daily lives. I can see this working for adults and older children but can see challenges in the daily swabbing of much younger children. I also think the reporting element will not be easy to manage and quality assure.
